You need <u>to show proof of your vaccination status</u> either with a printed copy of your certificate or a digital copy on your smartphone. If it's been over 9 months since your second vaccination, you will also need to have had your booster jab. See what fully vaccinated means in France.	You need to show <u>proof of your vaccination status</u> , either with a printed copy of your certificate or a digital copy on your smartphone. <u>See what fully vaccinated means in Switzerland.</u> However, the rules in resort are different – if your second vaccination was more than 4 months ago, you need to show proof that you've had a booster jab to get your 'pass vaccinal'. This applies to anyone aged 18 years and 1 month or older. You need to show your 'pass vaccinal' to check into your accommodation and enter enclosed public spaces in the resort and on the mountain.	Children aged 17 and under don't need to be vaccinated to travel to France. However, the rules in resort are different – if you're aged 16-17 you need to show proof that you're fully vaccinated or fully recovered from COVID-19 in the last 180 days to get your 'pass vaccinal'. You need to show your 'pass vaccinal' to check into your accommodation and enter enclosed public spaces in the resort and on the mountain. Do I need to take a test to travel to France?	You don't need to take a test to travel to France.		Children aged 11 and under don't need to take a test to travel to France. Unvaccinated children aged 12-17 need to book and pay for an antigen (lateral flow) test, to be taken in the 48 hours before their flight departure time or a PCR test, to be taken in the 72 hours before their flight departure time. Fully vaccinated children aged 12-17 don't need to take a test but will be asked to show their vaccination status.	
What forms do I need to fill in before I go?	Everyone aged 12 and over, regardless if your flight lands in France or Switzerland, needs to print out a ' statement of honour for travellers coming from a country on France's red list ' each and complete it by hand. Right now, the UK is on France's orange list – this can change quickly, so make sure you check the FCDO website for updates and print the correct 'statement of honour' shortly before you travel. On this form, you need to confirm that you've not had COVID-19 symptoms in the last 48 hours and that you've no knowledge of being in contact with a confirmed case of COVID-19 in the 14 days before departure. You also need to agree to take an antigen test or a PCR test on arrival in France if randomly selected to do so.			

	If your flight is to and from Chambéry Airport (France), you may also be asked to fill out a digital EU Passenger Locator Form (PLF) at the airport before you board your flight. We recommend filling this out before you get to the airport, as it's likely you'll be asked to show it.			
Do I need to buy a COVID- 19 ‘test to return’ to fly back to the UK?	You no longer need to take a COVID-19 test to return.

What will it be like on the mountain?	As well as the above, there’ll be regular checks on the mountain, so you’ll need to carry a digital or printed copy of your vaccination certificate and your passport so you can prove your identity. You’ll need your ‘pass sanitaire’ for ski school and the ski lifts. If your resort shares its ski area with another country and you plan on skiing across the border, you’ll need to check the entry requirements and local restrictions for that country too.		Children aged 12 and over should carry a copy of their vaccination certificate or proof they’ve recovered from COVID-19 as there’ll be regular checks on the mountain. We recommend putting a photocopy of their passport identity page in their ski jacket pocket.

Top tip: If you create a Passenger Locator Form (PLF) account, you can start filling out the form before you go on holiday, meaning it will be faster to complete and submit in the final days of your trip.</p>	<p>If you live in England, Wales or Northern Ireland children aged 17 and under can be included on an adult’s Passenger Locator Form (PLF), which needs to be completed in the 48 hours before you return to the UK. The child and the adult must be staying together at the same address, otherwise the child needs to complete their own form.</p> <p>If you live in Scotland children aged 15 and under can be included on an adult’s Passenger Locator Form (PLF), which needs to be completed in the 48 hours before you return to the UK. The child and the adult must be staying together at the same address, otherwise the child needs to complete their own form.</p>
